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

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


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Code of Ethics

6. I pledge to carry out the Goals and Objectives of WAD to the best of my ability, to the benefit of the disadvantaged communities of Namibia;
7. I pledge to uphold the non-partisan and non party-political philosophy of WAD and undertake to refrain from biased actions;
8. I pledge to continuously execute my duties efficiently and to enhance the professional image and interests of WAD at all times;
9. I accept responsibility for the quality of my services and undertake to solicit assistance, if need be;
10. I shall honour and uphold WAD's principles of Discipline, Unity, Courage and Honesty in all walks of my life.

Foreword

As I write the Foreword of the 7th edition of the 2012 "WAD Review", I could not help but take note of the events unfolding across North Africa since the beginning of 2011. It is too early to tell where this wave will take us, but I believe it is important for citizens to actively participate in determining the future of their communities and countries. As a woman and a former freedom fighter I am keenly aware of this fact.

As Government we are fully aware of the fact that our people need to be supported at all levels. The social and economic environment in which WAD does its work is challenging, particularly when one keeps in mind that Namibia is classified as a middle-income country albeit one with the most unequal income distributions in the world. It is estimated that one in four households in Namibia live in poverty and furthermore, the poorest 10 percent of households command just one percent of the country's total income. Poverty and deprivation is found in the rural areas and is affecting mainly women.

Women continue to be affected more and more by conditions of poverty because poverty is linked to women's inequality in society. Women make up the majority in terms of unemployment, and are treated unfairly by society as well as in their home environments. Women bear almost all responsibility for meeting basic needs of the family, yet they are systematically denied the resources they need to fulfil this responsibility. Today, HIV/AIDS is rapidly becoming a woman's disease. In several southern African countries including Namibia, more than three-quarters of all young people living with HIV are women. In this context, the work of WAD is invaluable.


Studies show that when women are supported and empowered, the entire society benefits. Their families are healthier, more children go to school, agricultural productivity improves and household incomes increase. In short, communities become more resilient.

So, when you read and study the "2012 WAD Review", please bear in mind the difficult situation in which Namibian women and children find themselves. You will then appreciate even more the work of Ms Veronica De Klerk and her team at WAD, but also the volunteers in the regions.

The Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare is glad to be associated with WAD because for the past 18 years, Women's Action for Development (WAD) has been empowering primarily rural women, young and old, by uplifting their socio-economic arena, with the explicit goal to complement the work of Government in its efforts to reduce poverty and unemployment.

Message

From the Executive Director

Veronica De Klerk



It is indeed a great privilege for *Women's Action for Development (WAD)*, to produce the 7th edition of the "WAD Review" which affords the reader a wide range of information on the programmes and activities of the organisation over the past 18 years.

Looking back over the past years, it has been a most rewarding experience to empower marginalized people... indeed a special calling! To see the awareness and excitement in the eyes of a woman who only endured hardships in her life, now for the first time experiencing empowerment through training and discovering her real self, is such an awesome experience that it causes the tremendous work load and some set-backs to seem minimal. Irrespective of those setbacks which have sometimes crossed our path, it remains a delightful mission for the team to pursue, and to take courage in the dawning of each new day to wade into the numerous challenges ahead of us, as we have been doing for the past years. We cherish our successes but our fuel remains *that* which we still need to accomplish.

WAD was overwhelmed when it was presented with a Golden Arrow Award in February 2012 by the "Professional Management Review" (PMR) of South Africa, for excellent Leadership and Achievements. It served as a welcome moral booster for our members and trainers because the highly dedicated skeleton staff in the Head Office often have to work under great pressure to meet deadlines. Thus, outside recognition for a job well done, is warmly appreciated.

During the period under review, WAD engaged in two of its largest projects ever undertaken. The project: "*My Rights as a Woman and Namibian Citizen*", which is currently being implemented by WAD and the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung over a period of 3 years, is funded with great appreciation, by the European Union and the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung to the tune of N\$4, 8 million, and is aimed at reaching 9 000 people in all 107 constituencies of the country. It further seeks to train women and men, including Law Enforcement Agencies, Journalists, Teachers, Parliamentarians, Government representatives, etc, in the contents of gender-related laws, aspects of the Namibian Constitution, the electoral process etc. It further seeks to educate women about their rights in terms of these laws; sensitizing women not to continue their tolerance of violence and other forms of abuse against them and to report and speak out against such violations without fear of retribution. Great appreciation is expressed towards our partners on this project, i.e. the Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare, the Law Faculty of the University of Namibia; and the Legal Assistance Centre, for their profound support.

Furthermore, WAD embarked upon an 18 month project to train close to 1 000 life skills teachers in secondary schools in the 13 regions of the country, in the causes and consequences of Gender Based Violence, eventually targeting 67 552 learners at Junior and Senior Secondary School levels. WAD furthermore, submitted a proposal to the National Conference on Education

- To henceforth view Life Skills with the importance and respect which it deserves by all players, i.e. the Ministry of Education, teachers, learners and the nation as a whole;

- To view Life Skills as a subject, crucial to prepare learners for life and to cultivate citizens to respect moral values, integrity, discipline, etc;
- To appoint teachers who are fully qualified to teach Life Skills;
- To develop a syllabus containing appropriate content for Life Skills; and
- To pronounce Life Skills as an examinable subject.

It remains, however, an ever nagging reality that 51,2 % of our population of working age are unemployed. This dark shadow hangs over 60% of women and 70% of the youth as well. This depressing situation is the direct cause of WAD's training workshops to be totally over-subscribed by young people who, after exiting Grade 12 discover that they are not yet qualified for any worthwhile position in the labour market.

Needless to say, the answer is for the Ministry of Education to establish more campuses for more students to access tertiary institutions and at the same time to bring vocational subjects back to secondary schools, to ensure that learners are equipped with at least a practical skill such as carpentry, welding, tailoring, etc to fall back on after they have completed Grade 12.

A Vote of Thanks: My sincere thanks goes to all international and local donors, as well as our BEE Partners as mentioned elsewhere in this publication, for their unfailing and unselfish commitment and support towards the empowerment of poor communities. It is this kind of humanitarian outreach which brings nations closer together, and which alleviates unemployment and poverty, but enhances self-help and self-sustainability.

My sincere appreciation goes to the Government of the Republic of Namibia, its Cabinet members, Governors, Mayors, Councillors, Tertiary institutions, the business sector, etc for so often leaving their busy offices behind to share development platforms with WAD and for believing in the organisation. WAD remains immensely grateful!



I thank our dedicated trainers and members for their valued contributions towards the cause in which we all so passionately believe.

their faith in the organisation and their continued contributions towards broad-based economic empowerment in the country.







Woman pilot makes Namibia proud!

I'm very grateful to my parents who stood with me and supported my dream"

Francy Beukes held on to her dream to be a pilot until the age of 19 when she started her training. As a result of hard work, in 2011 she moved the big Metal Bird ERJ 135 at Air Namibia. "You know, I am very grateful to my parents who stood with me and supported my dream", she said. Where there is a will, there is a way. This adage has indeed come true for Francy Beukes who, despite having suffered initial hiccups, has succeeded to be counted among the commercial pilots in the country. She completed the commercial pilot course in Namibia Aviation Administration at a young age of 21. More to her credit, Francy has completed various courses that qualify her to fly all kinds of aeroplanes, including the most modern planes, which fly passengers across the world. She already has flying experience of more than 1,600 hours, and carrying 37 passengers at the moment. Francy flies the Embraer Regional Jet to Zambia, Victoria Falls, South Africa, Botswana, Ondangwa, Katima Mulilo, and soon she will be flying all over the world. "I enjoy flying... I enjoy my work, though I always wanted to keep my profession a secret. When I sit in the flight deck, I just feel I am in my office taking care of my duties, and during that time I tell myself that I am going to Zambia, Katima Mulilo or where ever and my passengers are in safe hands," she said. Like many pilots, she began her airline career with a regional carrier. She did not mind about her salary as all she wanted was to fly the Jet. "You have to love flying, because the starting

remuneration is very low initially and in addition to that, you are away from home many times, and I don't know if that is desirable for many women," she said. Francy further expressed her observation that female pilots are excellent, adding that there are no particular extra skills or knowledge that male counterparts are better at. In conclusion and attributing her success to the Almighty and hard work, Francy encouraged young girls to join this profession, with confidence because female pilots are excellent when they acquire this skill. "JUST GO FOR IT!" exclaimed Francy Beukes.

EMILIA NGHINASHIPO - Building Contractor

Emilia Nghinashipo is a Namibian entrepreneur who started her career as a site clerk for Nexus building contractors in 2003. Between 2004 and 2005 she was a site clerk during the construction of the gravel road from Nepara – Gava, in the Rundu district. By 2006 she was the secretary of the Ongwediva Nexus Camp and continued being a secretary in 2007 and 2008 on the Ongha Railway.

During October 2009 she was appointed Manager of the Epatululo Trading Enterprises CC where she is currently involved in the construction of the road between Okahao and Outapi and her company is in charge of Labour based road (concrete work).

WAD had an exclusive interview with Emilia Nghinashipo Shimana, who has embarked upon a route that, until recently has been male-dominated. She is a major shareholder in Epatululo Trading, which was recently a beneficiary of the development Bank of Namibia's (DBN) Financial Scheme.

Q: What was the reason for you having entered the male-dominated world?

A: Because of who I am! I like being unique, self confident, well motivated and never have I ever stepped back.

Q: What challenges are you facing?

A: A lack of experience and being new in the market, there are a lot of small contractors in the industry - so it's hard and difficult to get a job;

- higher costs on hired equipment;
- shortage of equipment;
- sometimes Invoices are not paid on time (due to financial problems)

Q: Have you been accepted by your male counterparts?

A: Oh yes, men have been in the market for some time now, and they think that they are the only ones who can do construction work. Now they are dominating more than 80% of tenders. Unfortunately the Tender Board has the mentality that men can do better than women in the construction field. There

is much prejudice in society against women in the construction field. Just Imagine: (DR3642 OKAHAO – OUTAPI labour-based road) there are 6 small Contractors, but I am the only woman in the group. All 5 are men. This means that 16,6% are women, while 83,4% are men.

Q: Have you faced difficulties with your male counterparts?

A: No. They even help me and correct me where I need help.

Q: What could be done if women are not accepted. Do we need law intervention?

A: No - I will just accept the situation and consider it as a challenge and try harder. As I said, at the beginning there was a lot of SMEs in the industry, so we all cannot get jobs at the same time.

Q: What advice can you give to other women who think they cannot do this kind of work?

A: Men are just human beings like us. If they can do any job, we can do it as well! Women, let's not just sit down doing nothing or wait for somebody to spoon-feed you. Let's stand up and work on our own. Let's show the men that we can do anything which our physical strength allows us to do!

As the first Namibian black female to qualify as a Chartered Accountant and the first Namibian female to be appointed



DR HELENA NDUME - Eye Specialist

Dr Helena Ndume: "There's no money in this world that can pay the joy of someone who was blind for so many years and then suddenly regains their vision."

When you talk about Dr. Ndume, you are talking about a Namibian Ophthalmologist, notable for her charitable work among sufferers of eye-related illnesses in Namibia.

To date, Dr Ndume has ensured that some 30,000 blind Namibians have received eye surgery and are fitted with intra-ocular lens implants, free of charge.

She is currently the head of the Ophthalmology Department at the Windhoek Central Hospital, Namibia's largest hospital, and is one of only six Namibian ophthalmologists. Dr Ndume says: "We can't call ourselves a progressive nation if we still have people going blind from cataracts!"

A mother who had never set her eyes on her baby, a poor villager who hadn't worked for years, an old man who had never seen his pension money... these are just some of the thousands of blind Namibians whose lives have genuinely been transformed by the treatment of a woman who they call their "miracle doctor."

And to the many that she treats and inspires every day, she is seen as a 'miracle doctor'. In fact, this year alone, her eye clinics in Oshakati, Katima Mulilo, Engela, Gobabis and at Onandjokwe, which bring in doctors as volunteers from all over the

world to work with her, have given back sight to over one thousand people.

Training in exile:

The elegant Dr Ndume, who hails from Tsumeb, but went into exile at the age of 15, was dissuaded from becoming a fashion designer after high school in exile in the Gambia, by the likes of Nahas Angula, then a principal of a camp school.

Sight restoration, most commonly associated with the miracles performed by Jesus in the Bible, is part of Dr Ndume's daily routine.

Growing up in the South African-occupied South West Africa, as Namibia was then known, Ndume's desire as a teenager was to become a fashion designer. But she soon found that she had to give up her dream.

At the age of 15, Ndume was one of the many Namibians who went through Angola to Zambia to join the liberation movement that ultimately led to Namibia's independence. There, she was housed in camps of the South West Africa People's Organization where she was told that becoming a fashion designer was not an acceptable career path. So instead of following her fashion dream, Ndume was sent to Germany to become a doctor and in 1989 she returned to a liberated Namibia, keen to practise occupational health.

She was urged, however, to specialize in ophthalmology and help to tackle Namibia's bigger problem of blindness. In the beginning, Ndume remembers, people were a bit suspicious about having a woman doctor operating on their eyes. But after the first successful medical procedures, everybody started asking for help. "There were a few operations, people who came really blind with visual acuity who could only see light perception. They went back seeing again and that's how the message spread like wildfire," says Ndume.

She returned to Namibia in 1989, completed her medical internship at the Katutura and Windhoek Central hospitals, and with the encouragement of Dr Libertina Amathila, was then off again to Germany where she specialised in ophthalmology at the University of Leipzig. Dr Helena Ndume is truly a tremendous inspiration to other women to enter this exemplary profession... truly a doctor without borders.

Dynamic Women...

TJMAARIJA KAKUATA –

The only female Lighting Operator in Namibia

"Government should open a training centre for lighting engineering" – Tjmaarija

Tjmaarija is not just the only female lighting operator at NBC, she is the only woman in the whole country, who studied lighting engineering. *"I am feeling blessed and special and I am really proud of being a lighting operator,"* she said confidently.

Her biggest dream is encouraging women to gain strength and stand behind their own conviction. *"They need to be more ambitious and should say to themselves: I will face the challenge, whatever it is."* But her biggest advice for other women is: *First education – then birth!*

Growing up in Omaheke with her parents, Jamaica, as her friends are calling her, moved to Windhoek to attend Primary School. After finishing Grade 11, she met Ernst Herma, who is the manager of Playhouse and became her biggest inspiration in life. Mr Herma encouraged her to discover her talents. She always wanted to become either a teacher or an economist, because she is very good at mathematics. In the long run, her uncle advised her to study lighting engineering. After finishing grade 12 she attended the course with the financial and psychological help of Mr Herma and her uncle. Because there is no course for lighting engineering in Namibia, she had to attend a distant-learning course in South Africa.

Lighting operator is a highly paid job and Jamaica always gets a lot of job offers so that she can afford to reject it or even choose between it. *"And that is what should encourage other women to choose this career". Especially in Namibia*

with an unemployment rate of more than 50 percent, it is a good opportunity not being affected by that.

"The government should open a training centre for lighting engineering," Jamaica claimed. Less than ten lighting operators are working in Namibia: NBC has three, the National Theatre has one and the Playhouse hires only Freelancers. Jamaica has been working for all of them. *"You know, I don't like eating alone, I like to share,"* Jamaica said with a smile on her face. That is why she would like to open the first lighting school in Namibia. Women need to be aware of the course and the opportunities they have when attending this training. Jamaica is the best example to demonstrate that women can prevail in a male-dominated and highly technical domain.

But the success story is faced with challenges in the everyday working process.

The biggest challenge, she has to fight with, is her male colleagues. They do not allow women to be better than themselves and are not taking them seriously. They do not believe that a woman appropriates technical know-how and knows how to manage those things. Despite that fact, the management gives her the chance and time to show how creative she is. *"The most important thing to handle those situations is ignoring and passion. You will find me smiling every time even*



when someone is shouting at me . . That helps me to overcome my challenges." Self-confidence, creativity and passion are the most important personality traits someone should have. Jamaica is the best example.

But her biggest challenge is running a live show with audience. At this time a lighting operator is always under pressure. If the light is placed in the wrong angle, the quality of the whole production is getting worse. *"But mistakes make you get better,"* Jamaica said.

Jamaica is a great inspiration for other women entering a male-dominated sector. *"Don't bring yourself down and don't allow other persons doing it".* That is what she has done her whole life. Although Jamaica is unique in every regard, she is a great inspiration for other women to abolish the exception of being a female lighting operator in Namibia.

Meke Kapiya – ‘The Woman behind the TV camera!’

“My most important lessons in life can only be described by Hard work, Honesty, Love and Trust” – Meke

Meke Kapiya works for the Namibia Broadcasting Corporation (NBC) as a Camera Operator. She is amongst the brave women who have dared to enter the so-called male domain. In her own words, she says *“I feel so proud to be a Camera Operator and thankful to my family for their support. When I work I don't feel like a woman because we are doing the same job as men. But I really enjoy it and like my job.”* This of course does not mean that she has pride in her life as she humbly added that *“I want to be remembered as a down to earth person.”* Meke grew up in the Endola Village in Ohangwena Region and attended Primary School there before finishing Secondary School in Oshakati. There after she enrolled for Hospitality Studies and only completed the certificate level. Before completing the Diploma level she switched her career path to pursue a three (3) year Media Technology qualification at the College of the Arts in Windhoek, something she had always wanted. One of her lecturers encouraged her to specialize in Camera work. That indeed unlocked what was to be an exciting venture with her career. Upon finishing her studies, she landed an internship with NBC in 2006 before going back to her rural home. In 2009 Meke applied for a position as Camera Operator with the NBC for which she got the job. The NBC job was her first and she never looked

back until now. Camera work has since become part and parcel of her life and she likes it. Meke recalls how as a child, she so much fantasized about television, such that at one time, out of childish curiosity she wanted to 'open' the TV set so she could 'touch' the person who was speaking in there. It always bothered her how the TV and radio works. Meke believes that was the time when the 'seed was sown' for her to like media and it became her dream. She soon realized that for her dream to come true she needed to attend Media classes. *“I think a dream can come true.”* She said. How she discovered her career path makes her encourage other women to pursue their dream-jobs even if these jobs are dominated by men. *“Women should rise up and take on challenges.”* She says. Asked to comment on how she interacts with her male workmates, Meke expressed that her male colleagues treat her well (they even call her Queen Camera Operator) and she has no problems with them as long as she does the same as they do. *“It is not like I am a woman and I can relax. No! I must do the same.”* This was her remark. The other important thing to mention is that her job does not interfere much with her



private life as a woman and mother most of the times. Meke believes that every woman can do the job *“as long as you are powerful,”* she added. It is of great importance for her to tell the women and particularly young girls of this nation to always try their best to venture into the job areas of their preference adding that certainly women can do the same jobs as men. *“Let's show our energy and power. Viva woman!”* she said. In her closing remarks, Meke who strongly encourages women not to be totally dependent on their male counterparts for everything, said that her most important lessons in life can only be described by the four words... *“Hard work, Honesty, Love and Trust.”*



Powerful Nation-wide project launched to enhance Gender Equality in society

7 September 2011: WAD officially launched this ground-breaking project, to announce the facilitation of an impressive number of workshops in all 107 constituencies of the country, to train women, traditional leaders, spiritual leaders, journalists, regional politicians, party cadres, parliamentarians, the judiciary etc, in the contents of Gender-related laws, Human Rights, the Namibian Constitution, the electoral process etc, in an attempt to mobilize and equip women with confidence to run more enthusiastically for public office, after the results of the 2009 national elections and 2010 regional elections became known.

After these elections, women were profoundly

disappointed that the representation of women in the two Houses of Parliament had dropped significantly from 33% to 23%, 21 years after Namibia gained its Independence.

WAD and the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung are acting as the implementing agents of the project, while the Law Faculty of the University of Namibia, the Legal Assistance Centre and WAD's "Regional Community Voice" members are acting as trainers, together with the Ministry of Gender Equality and Child Welfare as supporting Ministry.

This project has a duration of 3 years and is funded by the European Union and the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung to the tune of N\$4,8 Million.



WAD enters largest-ever BEE deal with BidVest Namibia



Breaking New Ground

WAD launches training in the dehydration of fruit and vegetables at its Omahenene Training Centre

WAD trainers and rural communities trained in Food Processing, the Drying of Fruits and Vegetables, the production of Peanut Butter and the professional packaging thereof for the local and export markets:

12 August 2011: This milestone project was officially launched at the WAD Omahenene Training Centre in the Omusati region, at which time 20 WAD trainers across the country, were trained in Food Processing; the Drying of Fruits and Vegetables, the production of Peanut Butter, as well as the professional packaging thereof for the local and export markets.

The training was conducted by a Tanzanian expert, Ms Clara Ibihya, from the "African Women Agribusiness Network in Tanzania" while the packaging training was conducted by GIZ Consultant, Edmund Sunkutu from Zambia. The WAD trainers in turn, were assigned to their respective regions to train other unemployed women in these skills to start similar income-generating ventures.

WAD trainers have hitherto trained 20 unemployed women and men in Gobabis to acquire these skills, as well as 15 women at the WAD Hardap Training Centre at Rehoboth on 10 November 2011, at which time the

WAD highly commends the GIZ CHANCE Programme for having sponsored the project to the tune of N\$100 000,00 and for reaching out in this manner to poor rural women to acquire these unique skills, which will greatly contribute towards reducing the alarming unemployment rate of 60% among working women in the country.

Training and creating awareness in all Namibian secondary schools to prevent Gender Based Violence

800 Lifeskills teachers and teacher counsellors trained in Gender Based Violence

4 July 2011: The Namibian society witnessed WAD breaking new ground, when this two-year project was officially launched by the Minister of Education, Honourable Abraham Iyambo, at which time the sponsorship of the Spanish Government to the tune of N\$1 Million was announced.

The project was launched at a time when the Namibian society found itself in a serious crisis of Gender Based Violence and was compelled to admit to itself that the degree of violence against women and girls had escalated so profoundly that the citizenry were compelled to find new avenues to tackle this scourge head on!


To give impetus to the foregoing, WAD, as the Commissioning NGO and implementer of the project, formed a tri-partnership with the Ministry of Education, as the supporting Ministry, and the Law Faculty of the University of Namibia, as the training institution, to first and foremost, train 800 life skills teachers and teacher counselors in the causes and consequences of Gender Based Violence, after a research was conducted by WAD and the Social Sciences Faculty of the University of Namibia to determine the root causes of violence against women and girls. This training will, in the process, target 67 550 secondary school learners at Junior and Senior secondary school levels, in an attempt to dramatically reduce Gender Based Violence in the Namibian society.

The co-operation among the three aforementioned parties is an excellent example of how Government institutions and the private sector can form

synergies to achieve credible results and value for money invested. WAD expresses its sincere appreciation for the overwhelming willingness of the Ministry of Education and the University of Namibia to put their weight behind this project.

28 May 2009: The Anti-Corruption Commission and WAD formed a partnership to co-host this commendable awareness-raising and educative project on this day - "The Great Walk Against Corruption," on which more than 2 000 people from all walks of life participated.

The purpose of this historic project in which an equally historic number of corporate institutions, Ministries, Politicians, civil servants, etc participated, was intended to establish a culture of "Zero tolerance for corruption in the Namibian society." It was further intended to establish a powerful awareness-raising exercise among young and old in Namibia to refrain from engaging in corruption; and to report corrupt practices without fear of retribution.

It was during this time that WAD detected a serious lack of self-confidence and assertiveness among the most marginalized, to rise and speak out against corrupt practices without fear of retribution. Many did not know what the word "corruption" meant, let alone the destructive affects it holds for the poor! It is for this reason that WAD immediately supported and co-operated with the ACC, to assist the institution to disseminate educational materials and to partner on anti-corruption projects, to train the most marginalised to view corruption for what it really is and to become more assertive in exposing and reporting corruption in society.



65 members of the Namibian Police Force of both genders graduate in English statement-writing and English report-writing; computer literacy; and office administration to improve their work-related skills:

26 October 2010: New on the Agenda of WAD's training programmes, was improving the writing skills of Police Officers in Namibia's official language - English. WAD was very excited to present this course and to present 65 Police Officers of both genders in these skills, because it not only improved the daily communication among Police officers, their seniors and the general public, but also their ability to take down important statements of the public and greatly improved their report-writing in a professional manner.

It goes without saying that correct and logical statements in Namibia's official language, will greatly enhance the course of justice and will ensure that the perpetrators of laws, will pay the price for their criminal deeds.

It is therefore, imperative for Police Officers, as important servants of the public, to be able to state, in clear English language, exactly what they want to say, or what a complainant relates to them, when they take down statements for later use in Court. On the other hand, it will be a great embarrassment if the statements of

Police Officers are so poorly written that a case against a charged person is thrown out because of a confusing statement due to confused language - thereby allowing a perpetrator to get away, scott-free!

Other subjects in which Police officers were trained and presented with certificates, were Computer Literacy and Office Administration, to improve their work-related skills.


Training 173 members of the Namibian Defence Force of both genders from various regions in Computer Literacy and Office Administration:

It took many years of oppression and inequality, but women persevered and were tenacious enough, and resolute in their determination, to prove that they have what it takes to feature where their male compatriots have featured on their own for many decades.

Bishop Zephania Kameeta officially launches the publication "Women and Custom in Namibia"

19 November 2008: After a research was conducted by the "Human Rights and Documentation Centre" within the Law Faculty of the University of Namibia, on harmful cultural practices that still impede the development of women and contravene the Namibian Constitution, a book was published entitled: "Women and Custom in Namibia" with the financial support of the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung, to make the Namibian citizenry aware of these practices which are still the order of the day.

The WAD Executive Director, Veronica De Clerk, together with other experts, contributed towards articles in the publication: entitled: "Women's Action for Development: 17 years of experience with customary practice in rural Namibia", with the financial support of the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung, where after the publication: "Women and Custom in Namibia" was launched on 19 November 2008 by Bishop Zephania Kameeta, President of the Council of Churches, in the presence of 1 800 women from all walks of life, during the "Women's Celebratory Programme" in the Parliamentary Gardens in the capital.

Despite the fact that freedom is guaranteed to all Namibian citizens, including women and children, in the country's highly respected Constitution, the long and hard road which Namibian women and children still had to go, to reach their freedom, stretched dauntingly ahead of them when Namibia gained its independence during 1990!

WAD thus, with vigour and determination, embarked upon numerous educational programmes that would combat outdated, albeit firmly embedded practices, but was soon to realize with what fervor and conviction traditional men still defend those practices.

It was clear that such practices, that still impede the development of women, were instituted by men, for the convenience of men, and for the expression of power over women.











AIMS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE DISABILITY BENEFIT TRUST


1. Promote and facilitate the provision of services for health, treatment, rehabilitation, social security and education for Namibians affected by disability.






