Letter from the Director of KAS Israel

Letter from the Director of the BTC



During the latter stages of the Corinthiam Tempus project it became clear that, for BGU to progress further the complex in process internationalization harmonization and Europe, it was essential to create systematic awareness, understanding and critical appreciation of the Bologna Process at all institutional levels: and to develop strategic centers of Bologna stakeholders within the institution. The same was true, of course, for other institutions in Israel. The significant first step taken in Israel to tackle the lack of knowledge and understanding concerning Bologna was the establishment of the Bologna Training Centre (BTC) at BGU whose mandate is to provide Israeli institutions with the knowledge, understanding and tools necessary for an informed and critical appraisal of the Bologna Process and its benefits to the Israeli higher education system.

Established in early 2012, the center's activities are based on a core staff comprising the director and three PhD candidates from the area of European studies. The center's activities have been positively received and the BTC is already actively engaged with 12 colleges and universities.

Almost unimaginable only a few years ago, in 2012 the higher education arena in Israel witnessed the beginnings of an open discourse concerning the Bologna Process, Internationalisation, and the EHEA (European Higher Education Area). The BTC contributed to the creation of this discourse and we hope to continue as a significant player in this important dialogue.

History

In the beginning of 2012 the Bologna Training Center (BTC) at Ben-Gurion University of the Negev began its operations under the auspices of the Centre for the Study of European Politics and Society (CSEPS) in cooperation with The Israel Office of the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung. The BTC's intention is to facilitate the exposure of Israeli higher education institutions to the Bologna Process.

Throughout the academic year, the BTC staff has provided workshops and training to a wide spectrum of Israeli higher education institutions, on various aspects of the Bolgona Process reforms. In the past year, the BTC has also invited leading European experts of Bologna to provide training to Israeli higher education faculty and management.

The BTC sees itself as a disseminator of knowledge and information regarding the Bologna Process, in order to stimulate discourse concerning the Bologna Process in the Israeli academic arena.



BTC's Activities at Ben-Gurion University

Institutional involvement:

Promotion of BGU involvement with Tempus and ERASMUS MUNDUS projects: In addition to assisting BGU faculty and other institutions in developing new Tempus applications the BTC has initiated several Bologna related projects which it intends to submit for EU funding:



ESPRIT (Enhancing Social Characteristics and Public Responsibility of Israeli Teaching through a Student-HEI Alliance)

In recent decades there has been a growing preoccupation and pro-activism among students on the campuses of Israeli universities and colleges with socio-political and socio-economic issues that have surfaced in Israeli society. Israeli university and college students are increasingly involved in social engagement activities of various types. The "Student Empowerment through Social Involvement" project will examine the development of proactive social engagement in the Israeli student milieu and will attempt to understand its roots. By understanding the motivation and impact of social involvement in HEIs, the project will attempt to elaborate what could be the role of HEI faculty and institutions at the policy level, in their academic interaction with students. As the main societal institution serving a public good, we will examine to what degree these HEIs are themselves socially-conscious, by establishing a "Social Index" that will rank the Israeli HEIs according to their social character.

DOIT

A newly funded Tempus project Coordinated by the Gordon College of Education in Haifa dealing with the Promotion and development of multi-cultural education. DOIT enhances the quality of education in participating Israeli and Georgian Higher Educational Institutions by designing, piloting and implementing curricular reform which promotes Multicultural Education and Cultural Diversity Training. The Center for Excellence in Teaching at BGU is an active partner in this important new project.



BTC's Activities at Ben-Gurion University

Clusters

The concept emphasizes cooperation, decentralization and knowledge sharing among institutions of higher education in Israel and around the world. The BTC, as a national center which views itself as a hub of knowledge and training on all matters related to the "Bologna Process", seeks to expand the audience exposed to the reform, through the training of coordinators representing different disciplinary groups or "clusters". These coordinators will in turn become centers of knowledge and professional training in their fields, benefiting other academic institutions in the same professional "cluster". The leading institutions of each cluster, assisted by their respective member institutions, will examine their particular needs and apply the Bologna Processes' goals related to their professional fields. The clusters, together with the "Bologna Training Center" will then build a unique implementation mechanism suitable for each professional fields.

NOTA-BENE

During the last few years the terms, or buzzwords, Internationalisation and Bologna have begun to be part of the discourse in Israel's universities and colleges. The "Nota-Bene" project aims to establish an international network comprising EU and non-EU based institutions.


