


#### Are there consequences for young people?

- High school and college students' career goals are excellent predictors of their occupations later in life.
- From September 27 October 16, 2012, we surveyed a national random sample of young Americans (through GfK Custom Research LLC):
  - 2,163 high school students (ages 13 to17)
  - 2,117 full-time college students (ages 18 to 25)
- In July and August 2013, we conducted in-depth phone interviews with 115 survey respondents.


#### Young People's Interest in Running for Office


Have you ever thought that, someday, when you're older, you might want to run for a political office?






#### **But More Politics Means More Ambition**

- If you talk about politics with your parents, you're 4 times more likely to think about running.
- If your parents suggested it, you're 6 times more likely.
- If you talk about politics even just once a week with your friends, you're 5 times more likely.
- If you visit political websites regularly, you're **7 times** more likely.
- If you think that politicians have positive attributes, you're 5
  times more likely to think about running for office.

# Charting a New Course? 5 Ways To Inspire Young People to Run for Office

- YouLead Initiative
- PlayStation for Politics
  - High school and college students average about 14 hours of video game play every week.
- Political Aptitude for College Admissions
  - In OK and AZ, only 3% of high school students would pass a citizenship test.
- GoRun App
  - There are 500,000 elected offices in the U.S. And there's no central clearinghouse that identifies them.
- College Programs Targeted at Young Women


### The Gender Gap in Political Ambition, by Age



#### **Conclusions: The Bad News**

- 89% if young people have written off the idea of running for office. Ever.
- Most families do not prioritize politics. And when they do talk about it, conversations are often about contempt, inefficiency, and ineffectiveness.
- At school, with friends and peers, and through the media, young people avoid exposure to politics. The little they do see and hear tends to be negative, confrontational, and divisive.
- Young people are so turned off by politicians that running for office does not even occur to them as a way to apply their leadership abilities.
