The Conversation

As the 2016 municipal elections draw closer, lamp posts will be covered in election sloganeering posters, politicians will star in slick television adverts, and colourful rallies will make their way through communities. Politicians from all walks will vie for the attention of new voters, using impassioned speeches and even songs to offer promises and policies. For first time voters, this onslaught of politicised media can be overwhelming, sometimes leading to apathy.

Voters of every age must identify a party or movement that resonates with their personal emotional and material needs. How do young voters weigh up the sentiments of South Africa's past, the frustrations of the present and the challenges and opportunities of the future? The needs of young South Africans are wide – from jobs, to community safety, and well-functioning service delivery – all issues articulated (or not) in the polices put forward by political movements. So how do South Africans make their choice, if at all?

This Policy Conversation is the opportunity to directly engage with the learners who will become first timevoters in 2016. Learners will hear from panellists who will explain concepts in a language relevant to young South Africans, with the aim to equip them with the knowledge to make an informed decision. However, this is also an opportunity for them to voice their own frustrations in a safe and encouraging space, finding a solution through vibrant debate with our panellists and each other.
