The data will show the correlation between the approval and performance of leaders at national, provincial and local level and the management of the country and what citizens believe are priority areas.

The release event will include a presentation and a question and answer session and interviews can be conducted after the release.

Mr Jan Hofmeyr, the head of the Policy and Analysis unit at IJR, will open the event, and Mrs Anyway Chingwete, Afrobarometer project manager for Southern Africa and Ms Rorisang Lekalake, the Afrobarometer assistant project manager, will present the data.

South Africa, now its 21st year as a democracy is grappling with major issues such as inequality, unemployment and poverty and now also a slowing economy. Join us as we discuss these issues and find out what South Africans are saying about where we are as a nation.

## **Afrobarometer**

Afrobarometer is an African-led, non-partisan research network that conducts public attitude surveys on democracy, governance, economic conditions, and related issues across more than 30 countries in Africa. Five rounds of surveys were conducted between 1999 and 2013, and Round 6 surveys are currently under way (2014-2015). Afrobarometer conducts face-to-face interviews in the language of the respondent's choice with nationally representative samples of between 1,200 and 2,400 respondents.

The Afrobarometer team in South Africa, led by the Institute for Justice and Reconciliation and Plus94 Research interviewed 2,400 adult South Africans in August and September 2015. A sample of this size yields results with a margin of error of +/-2% at a 95% confidence level. Previous surveys have been conducted in South Africa in [2011, 2008, 2006, 2002 and 2000.
