In its efforts to foster dialogue and collaborations among the various stakeholders involved in climate change adaptation and mitigation, the Regional Program Energy Security and Climate Change Middle East and North Africa of Konrad-Adenauer Stiftung (KAS – REMENA) and MEDRC Water Research organize jointly the Middle East and North Africa Academy on Climate Diplomacy, from October 28 to November 03, 2019, Berlin – Germany.

Context:

Climate change is one of the greatest challenges of our era. Increasing water scarcity on the one hand, more flooding and extreme weather events on the other hand threaten millions of livelihoods across the world. This development can lead to more migration or trigger violent conflicts as witnessed in the Middle East in the past years. Therefore, there is an urgent need for action on multiple levels, especially cross-governmental collaboration which has the potential of mitigating climate change through countries' commitment to their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and to international climate policy.

Climate diplomacy builds not only on the power of policy makers, but also that of the private sector, civil society activist, and the scientific community. Climate diplomacy utilizes the combined efforts of the different stakeholders as a tool to achieve foreign policy objectives to promote peace and sustainable development.

In recent years, the dire need to include climate in the agenda of foreign policy has been called for – namely through climate diplomacy. But how does climate diplomacy actually happen? And how will it continue to shape the international efforts to confront the issue far beyond the Paris Agreement of 2015? Technology would be key to achieve the objectives, but politics are important as well in the form of traditional inter-state diplomacy in order to avoid negative social effects of the decarbonizing transition measures, especially in sensitive sectors such as industry and agriculture. Stronger climate ambition relies on the creation of positive feedback between the real economy, political interests, and diplomacy.

The Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung – REMENA together with MEDRC Water Research aspire for this academy to demonstrate the importance of climate diplomacy in dealing with the most challenging regional and international environmental, economic and social issues. To demonstrate this, the academy will bring to the table concrete examples and simulations. This training aims at providing a platform for young policy makers, researchers and civil society activists from the MENA region, to acquire the necessary tools of climate diplomacy. This platform will also be a chance to exchange and combine synergies for finding solutions to the global climate challenge with experts both from the MENA region and Europe.

Themes:

Training young policy makers, researchers and civil society activists on climate negotiations through the usage of interdisciplinary knowledge and skills to develop diplomatic capacities via the following four main themes:

- 1. Evolution of Climate Diplomacy;
- 2. Transboundary cooperation under political strain;
- 3. Political economy of Climate negotiations; and
- 4. Climate & water Diplomacy.

Objectives:

The academy invites young researchers, policy makers, and civil society activists from the MENA region and Turkey to better understand the current state of climate negotiations and governmental commitment in the MENA region. The academy will also highlight the need for suitable diplomatic solutions to motivate cooperation around the way natural resources are managed and the countries commitment vis-à-vis climate. This will be achieved through providing participants with a practical, creative, problem-solving approach to address conflicts related to climate challenges in the region.

Structure:

The academy welcomes young researchers, policy makers, and civil society activists to take part in the three main arrangements:

- 1. Capacity Building trainings;
- 2. Simulations; and
- 3. Working Group sessions.

The academy course will be delivered through a combination of training lectures, working group discussions, and simulations. Case studies will also be used to reflect on actual and potential climate related conflicts as well as cooperation processes. It will also be a chance to learn from approaches and tools applied in practice, such as joint fact finding, negotiation and mediation. Exercises such as mapping of stakeholder networks, applied games and role plays will be conducted to understand how to approach conflict as well as cooperation processes.

Outputs: On the last day of the academy, each of the five working groups will have to

submit a policy paper on climate diplomacy in the MENA region.

Schedule and Venue: The academy will be held in Germany's capital city of Berlin. It will start on

the evening of October 27 with a welcome dinner and finish on the evening of November 03 with a farewell dinner. Participants should arrive on October 27 and leave on evening of November 03 or during the day of

November 04, 2019.

Working Language: The working language of the academy will be English. Fluency in English is

required. There will be no simultaneous translation to other languages.
