Internship Report - Niharika Jacob



Introduction

Hi, I am Niharika Jacob, and I worked as an Intern at the India office of the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung (KAS) for a period of eight weeks (03rd June 2022 to 29th July 2022). Although I had previously done an internship in New Delhi, two years ago, at Brookings institute, the involvement in an institute of this significance and scale was new to me. I have come to appreciate the knowledge I possessed and even gained new perspectives. During the course of this internship, my learning has taken birth from various sources and shaped itself into a multi-dimensional space.

Working at KAS India and key takeaways

The internship opened up the international system to me as a whole and as parts. As a scholar of International Studies, the internship at KAS supplied me with discussions and view-points to understand and gather knowledge on these various dimensions stemming from international relations. The many events which were held by the institution (those that focused on the region with my interest and other regions as well) gave me an opportunity to learn how the world works as a web of interconnected activities.

During this internship, I learnt the method to scrutinize and question the happenings around me.
