Victims of the Nazi-Regime 1. mainly from Germany

- Political Opponents
- Jews from Germany (150.000 killed of 500.000)
- Sinti (German Roma, 25.000 killed)
- "Euthanasia" (forced sterilized: 360.000, killed: Action T 4: 70.000, 1942-45: 130-200.000, occupied countries: plus ~ 200.000)
- "Asocials" (25.000 killed)
- Homosexuals (persecuted: 90.000, KZ: 10.000)
- Jehovahs Witnesses (persecuted: up to 43.000, killed: 1.200)
- Justice of the German Armed Forces (killed: 15-20.000)

Victims of the Nazi-Regime 2. mainly from occupied countries

- Political Opponents
- Intellectuals
- Jews (6 Mio. killed)
- Roma (220-500.000 killed)
- Prisoners of War (Soviet Union: up to 3.3 Mio. killed)
- Military Internees from Italy (since Sept. 1943: 600.000 soldiers, around 45.000 killed till 1945)
- Forced Laborers (> 12 Mio. deported)
- Civilian Victims (SU: > 20 Mio. killed)

GDR:

- Antifaschist Resistance Movement
- Different State: Social System: Communist:
 Has nothing to do with Nazi-Crimes 1933-45

FRG:

- Up to four Decades of Mostly Silence
- Student-Movement 1968, "Dig Where You Stande"-Movement since End of the 1970ies:
- Crime Sites close to Actual Vicinity
- Acknowledgement of ALL Groups of Victims
- Years later: Question: Who was responsible?
 - Self-Critical,
 - Important Impact to Sociatal Developments

Perpetrators

Different levels

- High ranking members of the regime, structures, ideology
- Real murderer (CC guards, members of extermination units, doctors in hospitals, etc.)
- Based on a division of labor: Administration, Universities, Hospitals, Army
- Decision who becomes groups of victims:
 - Ideology, "Hitlers order" and constitutional state
 - Decentralised decisions connected with the specific historical situation, the personal activly engaged
 - Sometimes opposite to the ideology

International Restitution:

1952: London Agreement on German External Debts (Allies)

1952: Luxembourger Dept Agreement with the State of Israel

and the Jewish Claims Conference

Compensation in Germany:

GDR: Fighters against or Victims of the Nationalsocialist Regime

FRG: Federal Compensation Act, 1. Oktober 1953: only

"Germans who per persecuted because of political, rassist or

religious"

Many groups of persecutees have received compensation since the 1980: Sinti and Rome, Victims of Forced Sterilisation, Homosexuals, "Asocials", Victims of the Army Justice, Jehovas Witnesses, Forced Labourers

International:

- Few Specific Agreements during the 1960s
- Forced and Slave Labourers since 2000

- **200 250.000 Murderers**
- Division of Power: Doctors and Psychiatrists,
 Civil Servants, Railroder etc., etc.
- 1. Phase: Under the Auspices of the Allies
 - Nuremberg Trails
 - Court Proceedings against SS,
 Concentration Camp Officers and
 Guards, Prison Centence
 - No German Citicens extradited

2. Phase: Souvereign German States East Germany:

- Some trials against perpetrators,
- Govermental and Socital Change of Elites
 West Germany:
- Successor State of the Nazi-Regime (Legal importance)
- Until 1959 no Prosecution of State Crimes 33-45
- Only a very small number indicted
