MIDDLE POWER AGENCY IN AN INDO-PACIFIC ERA

The growing US-China rivalry is increasingly putting the security and stability of Asia at risk. As core regional and global institutions are under stress, there are new pressures on secondary and small countries to align with either the US or China. But there still may be latitude for Middle Power maneuvre. This workshop brings together scholars and experts to explore and debate options and specific actions that can be taken by some key countries that have a major stake in minimizing the risks of polarization, techno-nationalism, and spirit of confrontation that are often embedded in the instensifying rivalries in the "Indo-Pacific" era.

ABOUT THE WORKSHOP

The regional order in an area alternatively defined as Asia-Pacific or Indo-Pacific is entering an era of acute disequilibrium. The geo-political rivalry between the United States and China is in a dangerous downward spiral accelerated recently by the Taiwan dispute and the spill over from the Russia-Ukraine war. In addition to new pressures on other countries large and small to position themselves in this polarizing conflict, there are new challenges of inflation, supply chain disruptions, high-tech decoupling, thickening borders, and increasing nationalism.

Existing regional multilateral institutions like APEC and those hosted by ASEAN promoting open regionalism, cooperation across ideological and political divides have been joined by a fast proliferating set of mini-lateral arrangements such as the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue (the Quad) and AUKUS intended to strengthen coalitions of the like-minded that strengthen the US-based alliance system.

The regional institutional noodle bowl is thickening but the noodles are made of very different ingredients—rice, wheat and potato that don't necessarily complement one another. While there are temporary ad hoc coalitions designed to address a particular problem, the issue we now confront is what kind of institutions can mitigate the geo-political competition between the United States and China.

All of these developments call for a reassessment of what kind of regional order is developing and what countries other than the United States and China prefer and can contribute.

There have been many efforts in the past decade to define Middle Powers based on functional, positional, behavioural, and attitudinal dimensions. They need not be duplicated. But they do need to be redefined in light of a new strategic context of great power rivalry and economic interdependence.

Rather than re-visit these debates, this workshop brings together a group of academics who are familiar with policy developments in their own countries and who are particularly interested in institutional architecture and the future of multilateral institutions designed to advance inclusive cooperation intended to mitigate great power conflict, especially in the areas of security and economy.

The countries are Australia, Canada, Germany, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, New Zealand, Singapore, and South Korea. Each is an interesting exemplar of a country that has been committed to or, at least explored, an explicitly Middle Power role. They vary in the level of economic and military dependence on the US, and how far they feel comfortably supporting the US as an automatic reflex as compared to on an issue-by-issue basis. However, all seek to maintain deep economic interactions with China while promoting international norms connected to a rule-based multilateralism.

The workshop intends to bring more clarity in understanding state behavior and the hard choices that governments face in positioning in this new environment. It also aims to be prescriptive.

Paul Evans

University of British Columbia



Paul Evans (PhD with distinction Dalhousie University 1982) has been a Professor at the University of British Columbia since 1999, teaching Asian and trans-Pacific international relations. His work was based at the Institute of Asian Research and the Liu Institute for Global Issues which are both located in the School of Public Policy and Global Affairs (SPPGA). In 2022, he was the 7th Pok Rafeah Chair at the Institute of Malaysian and International Studies (IKMAS), Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM). On January 1, 2021, Dr. Evans was appointed the HSBC Chair in Asian Research. Between 2005 and 2008, he was seconded from UBC to serve as the Co-CEO and Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Asia Pacific Foundation of Canada. An

advocate of cooperative and human security, he has been studying and promoting policy-related activity on track-two security processes and the construction of multilateral institutions since 1988. He was a co-founder of the Council for Security Cooperation in Asia Pacific (CSCAP), the Canadian Consortium on Human Security, and the Canada-Korea Forum. He has directed exchange and partnership projects with fifteen research institutes in Asia and the Chinese Ministry of Foreign Affairs funded by governments and foundations in Canada, Japan, the United States, China, Taiwan, South Korea, Thailand and Indonesia. Between 1990 and 2002 he organized two dozen meetings involving participants from North Korea. He is currently a Canadian representative on the ASEAN Regional Forum's Experts and Eminent Persons Group. A member of the Global Council of the Asia Society in New York, he also sits on the editorial boards of *The Pacific Review*, the *Chinese Journal of International Politics*, the *China Quarterly for International Strategic Studies*, and *Mexico y la Cuenca del Pacifico*.

Kuik Cheng-Chwee



Institute of Malaysian and International Studies (IKMAS); EAIR Caucus

Kuik Cheng-Chwee is Professor of International Relations and Head of Asian Studies at the Institute of Malaysian and International Studies (IKMAS), Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM). Previously, he was a Postdoctoral Research Associate at the Princeton-Harvard "China and the World" Program and a Visiting Research Fellow at Oxford University. Professor Kuik's research focuses on small-state foreign and defence policies, Asian security, and international relations. He served as Head of the Writing Team (2019-2020) for the Government of Malaysia's inaugural *Defence White Paper*. Cheng-Chwee's publications have appeared in such peer-reviewed journals as *International Affairs*, *Pacific Review, Journal* of Contemporary China, Chinese Journal of International Politics, and Contemporary Southeast Asia. Cheng-Chwee's essay, "The Essence of

Hedging", won the Institute of Southeast Asian Studies' Michael Leifer Memorial Prize. He is co-author (with David Lampton and Selina Ho) of *Rivers of Iron: Railroads and Chinese Power in Southeast Asia* (2020) and co-editor (with Alice Ba and Sueo Sudo) of *Institutionalizing East Asia* (2016). His current projects include: hedging in international relations, elite legitimation and foreign policy choices, and the host-country agency in connectivity cooperation. Cheng-Chwee serves on the editorial boards/committees of *Contemporary Southeast Asia, Australian Journal of International Affairs, Asian Perspective, Asian Politics and Policy, International Journal of Asian Studies*, and *East Asian Policy*. Sufian holds an LL.B from Cardiff Law School, an LL.M (Merit), University College London and a Doctor in Law (summa Cum Laude) from University of Bern, Switzerland.

Tan Sri Dato' Seri Dr. Syed Hamid bin Tan Sri Syed Jaafar Albar

Former Foreign Minister of Malaysia



Tan Sri Dr. Syed Hamid began his career in the Judicial and Legal Service as a magistrate in 1970 and was appointed President of the Sessions Court in 1971. He then pursued a career in the financial and banking sector locally and internationally from 1972 to 1986. In the years 1986 to 1990, he became a partner in the law firm of Albar, Zulkifly and Yap. He was a Member of Parliament from 1990 to 2013, during which time he held various ministerial positions including Minister in the Prime Minister's Department and Minister of Justice, Minister of Defence, Minister of Home Affairs and most notably, Minister of Foreign Affairs. Tan Sri Dr. Syed Hamid's last held position was Chairman of the Land Public

Transport Commission of Malaysia (SPAD), from 2010 to 2017. Tan Sri Dr. Syed Hamid holds a Barrister-at-Law degree from the Middle Temple, U.K. and was called to the Malaysian Bar in 1974. He also holds a Master Degree in Human Sciences (Political Science) from International Islamic University Malaysia and a PhD in International Relations from Asia e University, Kuala Lumpur. Tan Sri Dr. Syed Hamid is the Chancellor of AeU University and currently is an Adjunct Professor of three (3) universities, namely, University Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), University Malaya (UM), University Melaka (UNIMEL) and Kuala Lumpur Metropolitan University College (KLMUC) as well as Chairman of the OIC Study Group (OICSG). Syed Hamid has contributed books, essays and articles to national, regional, international media and academic journals. He appeared in many political and current affairs programmes on BBC, CNN, ALJAZEERA as well as with local TV channels. He is also actively involved with regional and global humanitarian activities. He was the founder and President of HUMANITI Malaysia, an NGO involved in humanitarian activities. Served as a Special Envoy to Myanmar, of the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC). In recognition of his services to the nation, Tan Sri Dr. Syed Hamid was conferred the Order of the Defender of the Realm (PMN) by the King of Malaysia which carries the title "Tan Sri", in 2009. He was conferred the Grand Cordon of the Order of the Rising Sun by The Emperor of Japan in 2019 for his valuable contribution to the development of Malaysia/Japan High Speed Railway and the good relation between Malaysia and Japan. He is an Advocate and Solicitor and Managing Partner in Noor Amran & Co since July 2020.

Dr. Rizal Sukma

Centre for Strategic and International Studies, Jakarta



Dr. Rizal Sukma is a Senior Fellow at the Centre for Strategic and International Studies, Jakarta. Previously, he was Indonesia's Ambassador to the United Kingdom, Ireland and the International Maritime Organization (IMO), London, from 2016 to 2020. He joined CSIS in 1990 as a researcher and assumed the role of Executive Director in 2009 until 2015. Dr. Sukma also served as former Chairman of International Relations, Muhammadiyah Central Executive Board (2005-2015). Since receiving a PhD in International Relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) in 1997, he has worked extensively on such issues as Southeast Asian security, ASEAN, Indonesia's defense and foreign

policy, military reform, Islam and politics, and domestic political changes in Indonesia. Dr Sukma has served as a member of the National Committee on Strategic Defence Review at the Ministry of Defence, and as a member of the National Drafting Committee for the National Defence Bill (2000–2002) and the Armed Forces Bill (2002–2003). He was the first Indonesian to receive the Nakasone Award, in July 2005, and named one 100 Global Thinkers in 2009 by Foreign Policy magazine. He has published three books: *Security Operations in Aceh: Goals, Consequences, and Lessons* (Washington, DC: East-West Centre, 2004); *Islam in Indonesia's Foreign Policy* (London: Routledge, 2003), and *Indonesia and China: The Politics of A Troubled Relationship* (London: Routledge, 1999).

Moon Chung-In

Professor Emeritus at Yonsei University; Vice President of Asia-Pacific Leadership Network for Nuclear Disarmament and Non-Proliferation (APLN) South Korea



Moon Chung-In is a professor emeritus at Yonsei University and editor-in-chief of *Global Asia*, a quarterly journal in English. He is also Vice Chairman of APLN (Asia-Pacific Leadership Network for Nuclear Disarmament and Non-Proliferation). and Krause distinguished fellow at School of Global Policy and Strategy at the University of California, San Diego. He was a special advisor to the ROK president for foreign affairs and national security (May 2017 to February 2021) and chairman of the Sejong Institute (2021-2023), a leading private think tank, in South Korea. He was dean of the Graduate School of International Studies, Yonsei University and served as Ambassador for International Security Affairs of the Korean

Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade and Chairman of the Presidential Committee on Northeast Asian Cooperation Initiative, a cabinet-level post. Prof. Moon was a special delegate to the first (2000), second (2007), third Korean summit (2018) held in Pyongyang. He has published over 60 books and 300 articles in edited volumes and scholarly journals.

Evelyn Goh

Shedden Professor of Strategic Policy Studies at the Australian National University)

Singapore



Evelyn Goh is the Shedden Professor of Strategic Policy Studies at the Australian National University, where she also directs the Southeast Asia Institute. Professor Goh has published widely on U.S.-China and China-Japan relations (contemporary and historical), international order and East Asian orders, Southeast Asian strategies towards great powers, and non-traditional security. Her books include *Constructing the US Rapprochement with China, 1961-1974: From Red Menace to Tacit Ally* (Cambridge University Press, 2004); *The Struggle for Order: Hegemony, Resistance and Transition in Post-Cold War East Asia* (Oxford University Press, 2013); *Rising China's Influence in Developing Asia* (OUP, 2016); and (co-authored with Barry Buzan) *Re-thinking*

Sino-Japanese Alienation: History Problems and Historical Opportunities (OUP, 2020). Evelyn is an elected Fellow of both the British Academy and the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia, and convenes the international Graduate Research & Development Network on Asian Security (www.gradnas.com). She has served on the World Economic Forum's Global Futures Council on International Security. Since joining the ANU in 2013, she has led strategic initiatives to translate scholarly research into policy engagement and strategic literacy for Australian Defence. She held previous faculty positions at the Rajaratnam School of International Studies in Singapore, and at the Universities of Oxford and London, as well as visiting positions at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars and East-West Center, both in Washington DC.

In English, his recent articles appears on China International Strategy Review, Contemporary Politics, and Journal of Contemporary China. He sits on government panels including Council on the Actual State of Land Use, Advisory Panel on Science & Technology Diplomacy, and Expert

Panel on 50th Year of Japan-ASEAN Friendship and Cooperation. He also works as Faculty Fellow, Research Institute of Economy, Trade, and Industry; Visiting Fellow, 21st Century Policy Institute, Keidanren; Research Fellow of Japan Center for International Exchange.
