Top Story

Fianna Fáil may be willing to commit to allowing Fine Gael to introduce three budgets as part of a deal to allow a minority government to take office.

Advisers from both met on Wednesday to finalise a deal, which should allow a Fine Gael-led minority government take office next week.

Under the terms of the deal, an expert commission will be established to examine funding models for a national water system along with charging and conservation incentives. To read more, <u>click here</u>.
