



# THE SYRIAN CONFLICT, MIGRATION AND THE REFUGEE CRISIS IN JORDAN

**SURVEY** 

#### INTRODUCTION

Despite its weak economy and scarcity of resources, Jordan has shown itself to be extraordinarily generous in its reception and care of Syrian refugees since the outbreak of the Syrian civil war in 2011. With 89 refugees per 1000 inhabitants, Jordan has the second-largest ratio of refugees to population amongst Syria's neighbors that have taken in refugees (Lebanon has the highest ratio). The Hashemite kingdom is perceived as a model country in its treatment of refugees, who are allowed access to state healthcare and education. Consequently, Jordan has received significant international financial support. Despite this support, the influx of refugees has increased the already existing domestic challenges in Jordan. Property and rent prices, especially in those areas hosting large numbers of refugees, have risen immensely. The demand for water increased to the extent that Jordan went from occupying the 4th to 2nd place on the ranking for the countries with the least water per capita. The healthcare system, too, is beyond capacity. At the same time, Jordan faces its own domestic economic crisis, as price hikes and a reformed income tax law have increased dissatisfaction among the people. This survey looks into the perceptions of Jordanians and Syrian refugees of each other, the perceived impact of the refugee crisis on Jordan and tackles Syrian and Jordanian views on the Syrian conflict and the broader topic of migration. #### **MAIN FINDINGS**


- 78,2% of Syrians consider Jordan to be the country that treats refugees best (Canada 5,7%, Turkey 2,5%, Germany 1,6%)
- 56% would choose Jordan and 19% would choose Canada as the place to go as a refugee (USA 3,5%, Germany 2,5%)
- 97,7% of Syrian refugees have felt welcomed in Jordan to a great or medium extent
- 43% of Syrian refugees will probably or definitely go back to Syria while 56% will probably or definitely never go back
- 31,3% of Jordanians and 44,5% of Syrians want to migrate to another country
- 49,2% of Jordanians expect the Jordanian economy to worsen in the future (only 5,3% of Syrians agree)
- 86,5% of Jordanians believe Syrian refugees should return to Syria and 81,3% of Jordanians do not think that Jordan should have taken more Syrian refugees
- 46,8% of Syrian refugees believe that Jordan should have done more to support them, only 23,6% of Jordanians agree
- 66,4% of Jordanians say that the presence of Syrian refugees in the country has had a negative effect on their life, citing negative effects on the economy, public debt, healthcare quality and security
- Nevertheless, 66,8% of Jordanians describe their feelings towards Syrian refugees as very or somewhat positive
- 89% of Jordanians and 88% of Syrians agree or strongly agree with the reopening of the Jordanian border with Syria
- 74,1% of Jordanians and 74,2 % of Syrians are neither supportive of the Syrian opposition nor the Syrian government in the conflict

#### SAMPLING AND METHODOLOGY


- The poll was conducted in November 2018 by NAMA.
- It covered a sample comprising of 1,305 Jordanians and 600 Syrian refugees in Jordan.
- The survey tool was designed cooperatively between KAS and NAMA.
- A primary draft was prepared and revised.
- Interviews were conducted through face-to-face interviews.
- The supervisor monitors the data collection and ensures the implementation of quality assurance measures.
- There are two functions specifically assigned to the data analysis team. They simultaneously handle the statistical analysis of the multiple choice questions in addition to the coding and analysis of the open ended answers through statistical analysis software such as SPSS & CSPro.








#### TO WHAT EXTENT HAVE YOU FELT WELCOMED IN JORDAN?






### REGARDING RETURNING TO SYRIA, HOW DETERMINED ARE YOU TO GO BACK?



#### WHERE DOES YOUR INCOME COME FROM?








## DO YOU BELIEVE THAT JORDAN WILL BE ECONOMICALLY BETTER IN THE NEAR FUTURE?






#### **SHOULD SYRIAN REFUGEES RETURN TO SYRIAN?**




#### SHOULD JORDAN HAVE TAKEN IN MORE REFUGEES?




#### WHO DO YOU THINK SHOULD HAVE TAKEN IN MORE REFUGEES?



### DO YOU BELIEVE THAT JORDAN SHOULD HAVE DONE MORE TO SUPPORT SYRIAN REFUGEES?











## DO YOU THINK THAT SYRIAN REFUGEES HAVE INCREASED OR DECREASED THE FOLLOWING?



#### HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR FEELINGS TOWARDS SYRIAN REFUGEES?




#### WHAT POSITIVE EFFECTS HAVE THE SYRIAN REFUGEES HAD?




#### WHAT DO YOU THINK OF OPENING THE BORDER WITH SYRIA?




### DO YOU THINK OPENING THE BORDER WITH SYRIA WILL HAVE THE FOLLOWING EFFECTS?






### HOW DO YOU DESCRIBE THE POLITICAL RELATIONS BETWEEN THE FOLLOWING GOVERNMENTS?






### DO YOU BELIEVE THAT JORDAN SHOULD HAVE DONE MORE TO SUPPORT SYRIAN REFUGEES?








### HOW DO YOU VIEW THE FOLLOWING COUNTRIES' ROLES IN THE SYRIAN CONFLICT?










