Russia is back on stage. This sentence appears time and again on the pages of newspapers, in think tanks' reports and in politicians' speeches about the situation in post-Communist Europe. The Ukraine crisis and the annexation of Crimea in March 2014 sparked yet another confrontation between Russia and the West, and a new 'big geopolitical game' is underway in the Balkans.

In this book, Dimitar Bechev goes beyond the stereotypes and offers a sober analysis not only of the Russian influence in Southeast Europe but also of the serious limitations to that influence. At the same time, he debunks the myth that the countries of the region and their leaders are merely 'victims' of Moscow's treachery. Southeast Europe is a field of rivalry between an ambitious Kremlin, which has clearly defined goals but lacks the means to achieve them, and a divided West, which is in two minds on how to respond to the challenge. Meanwhile, the countries of Southeast Europe and Bulgaria in particular keep looking for a way of their own in the turbulent waters of this rivalry: advancing Westward while looking Eastward.

The basic tenets in the book will be presented by respected experts and current affairs authors who take an active stance and have amassed professional experience in Middle East matters. Diplomats, politicians, analysts and civil society representatives will also join the discussion.
