11:30 Panel 6: Unmasking Sharp Power: Authoritarian Influence on Media in East-Asia

Amidst the global democratic backsliding and the concurrent rise of authoritarianism, it has become imperative to address the projection of sharp power from authoritarian countries onto democratic nations. Sharp power, unlike hard power reliant on economic and military might, and soft power derived from cultural appeal and values, encompasses informal and unofficial tactics aimed at exacerbating divisions within a democracy or shaping favourable public opinion towards an authoritarian regime through propaganda and public diplomacy strategies. Geographically situated in close proximity to two influential authoritarian states, China and Russia, East Asia finds itself at the forefront of experiencing the deployment of sharp power. In this panel, scholars from Japan, Taiwan, and Hong Kong will present their research and engage in discussions concerning the impact of authoritarian states' sharp power on public opinion.
